Catalog of Letters

The Catalog lists all the letters, documents, and collections of items, generally by type of document, associated persons, date, and brief description. Clicking on any document title takes you to that document, often containing both a copy of the original and the transcribed document. (click on the blue title)

Further Documents for Transcription

There remain hundreds of Locust Grove letters available for transcription. Perhaps 100 of these have been kept at Locust Grove and are listed in *Parlor Letters*. Several boxes of family documents were removed from Locust Grove in 1962 for safekeeping and are now in the possession of Dan Stickley Jr.'s daughter, Carolyn Bragg of Stuarts Draft, who is making them available to the family as needed for transcription.
